
Thank You for Celebrating Disability Pride Month with us!

The film follows the 1988 protest at Gallaudet University, the only Deaf liberal arts university in the world, which was led by hearing individuals until the first Deaf president, I. King Jordan. 
Disability Pride Took Center Stage at LEAP's Disability Pride Party




